

RESUSCITATION VERSUS RESURRECTION

- A. **RESUSCITATION** – bringing a person back to life from the dead in his or her same perishable body. These people subsequently die again.
1. **Samuel** is resuscitated by God. (1 Sam. 28:11-19)
 2. Elijah resuscitated a boy, the **son of a widow in Zarephath**. (1 Kings 17:20-24)
 3. Elisha resuscitated a boy, the **son of a Shunamite woman**. (2 Kings 4:32-37)
 4. **Jonah** was resuscitated by God. (Jonah 1:15-2:10)
 5. Jesus resuscitated a **man in the city of Nain**. (Luke 7:11-15)
 6. Jesus resuscitated the **daughter of Jairus**, a synagogue official, probably at Capernaum. (Matt. 9:18-20; Mark 5:22-43)
 7. Jesus resuscitated **Lazarus** of Bethany, the brother of Mary and Martha. (John 11:1-43)
 8. **Many people** were resuscitated in Jerusalem on resurrection Sunday. (Matt. 27:52-53)
 9. The Lord Jesus resuscitated the **apostle Paul** outside of Lystra. (Acts 14:19-21 with 2 Cor. 12:1-4)
 10. Paul resuscitated **Eutychus** at a teaching conference in Troas. (Acts 20:7-10)
 11. **The two witnesses**, probably Moses and Elijah, will be resuscitated during the future “tribulation” period. (Rev. 11:3-12)
 12. It is possible, even probable, that “**Antichrist**,” also known as “*the beast out of the sea*” and “*the beast that comes up out of the abyss*,” will be resuscitated from ancient times during the future “tribulation” period. (Rev. 11:7; 17:8; cf. Rev. 13:1ff)
- B. **RESURRECTION** – bringing a person back to life from the dead into an imperishable body, never to die again. (Daniel 12 1, 2; 1 Cor. 15:42, 54)
